TNPSC BITS

- ❖ India's first taxi ambulance services was flagged off by Union Minister for Road Transport and Highways Nitin Gadkari in New Delhi. A start-up named Wagon Cab has launched this service with drivers who are trained medically keeping in mind the increasing number of accidents.
- ❖ More than 34 years after coming into existence, the Sports Authority of India (SAI) is set to be renamed as Sports India. The word authority has been removed.

NATIONAL

LG Does Not Have Independent Powers - SC

- ❖ The Supreme Court held that Lieutenant Governor Anil Baijal does not have independent decision making powers.
- ❖ It also held that LG is bound to act on the aid and advice of the Council of Ministers and he cannot act as an "obstructionist".
- ❖ The landmark verdict came on the breakdrop of power tussle between the Delhi government and the Centre.
- ❖ The Supreme Court stated that except for three issues, including land and law and order, Delhi government has the power to legislate and govern on other issues.

Cabinet Approvals

Agartala Airport Renamed

- ❖ The Union Cabinet approved proposal of renaming Agartala Airport in Tripura as 'Maharaja Bir Bikram Manikya Kishore Airport, Agartala.
- ❖ He was the king of Tripura from 1923 to 1947 before its merger with India.
- ❖ He is considered the father of modern architecture in Tripura, as entire planning of present-day Tripura was initiated during his rule.





Relief and Rehabilitation of Migrants and Repatriates

- ❖ Cabinet has also approved umbrella schemes for Relief and Rehabilitation of Migrants and Repatriates.
- Cabinet has given its approval for continuation of eight existing schemes of Home Ministry up to March 2020 for relief and rehabilitation of migrants and repatriates.
- ❖ The schemes will cover benefit displaced families from Pakistan-administered Kashmir, Sri Lankan refugees, Bru families lodged in relief camps in Tripura, 1984 anti-Sikh riot victims, civilian victims of terrorist, communal and Maoist violence.

Recapitalization of Regional Rural Banks

- ❖ Union Cabinet has approved extension of scheme of recapitalization of Regional Rural Banks (RRBs) for next three years (upto 2019-20).
- ❖ This will enable RRBs to maintain minimum prescribed Capital to Risk Weighted Assets Ratio (CRAR) of 9%.
- ❖ It will ensure strong capital structure and minimum required level of CRAR.
- ❖ This will facilitate financial stability of RRBs and enable them to play greater role in financial inclusion and meeting credit requirements of rural areas.
- ❖ The scheme of Recapitalization of RRBs was started in 2010-11 and was extended twice in the year 2012-13 and 2015-16.

Accession to WIPO Copyright Treaty and WIPO Performance and Phonograms Treaty

- ❖ The Union Cabinet has approved India's accession to WIPO Copyright Treaty, 1996 and WIPO Performers and Phonograms Treaty, 1996
- ❖ These treaties which extends coverage of copyright to the internet and digital environment.
- ❖ The proposal was submitted by Department of Industrial Policy and Promotion (DIPP), Ministry of Commerce and Industry.
- ❖ Both treaties provide framework for creators and right owners to use technical tools to protect their works and safeguard information about their use i.e.
 - o Rights Management Information (RMI) and
 - o Protection of Technological Protection Measures (TPMs).





Creation of posts of Vice-Chairperson and Member in NCSK

- ❖ Union Cabinet has approved creation of one post each of Vice-Chairperson and Member in the National Commission for Safai Karmacharis (NCSK).
- ❖ The decision aims at optimizing functioning of NCSK and fulfilling desired objectives of welfare and development of target group.
- ❖ At present, it has sanctioned strength of four members and a chairperson.
- With this posts, sanctioned strength of NCSK will be one Chairperson, one Vice-Chairperson and five members.

Slew of directions on police reforms - SC

- ❖ The Supreme Court bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra passed a slew of directions on police reforms in the country.
- ❖ It ordered all states and Union territories to not appoint any police officer as acting Director General of Police (DGP).
- It has directed all the states to send names of senior police officers to the UPSC for being considered as probable candidates to be appointed as DGPs or Police Commissioners.
- ❖ The UPSC, in turn, will prepare a list of three most suitable officers and the states will be free to appoint one of them as police chief.
- ❖ The court was hearing the Centre's plea seeking modification of one of its directions, which were part of its historic 2006 verdict on police reforms.
- ❖ On September 22, 2006, the Supreme Court delivered a historic judgment in Prakash Singh v. Union of India case,
 - Constitution of the State Security Commission at State level
 - o Transparent procedure for the appointment of DGP who shall enjoy a minimum tenure of two years
 - Other police officers on operational duties, such as Superintendents of Police, shall also have a minimum tenure of two years.
 - Establishment of a Police Establishment Board, which will decide all transfers, postings, promotions and other service related matters of police officers.
 - Setting up of a National Security Commission at the Union level to prepare a panel for selection and placement of Chiefs of the Central Police Organisations (CPO).





 Separation of the investigation; and law and order functions of the police.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Koala bear genome decoded

- ❖ An international team of 54 scientists has successfully sequenced the marsupial's whole genome. The whole genome was found to consist of over 26,000 genes.
- * Researchers found expansions within a particular gene family (P450 gene) and reported that these genes help the koala detoxify the eucalyptus leaves.
- * Researchers also reported that the lactation proteins protect the young ones in the pouch and help it develop a strong immune system.
- ❖ The koala Phascolarctos cinereus, or, inaccurately, koala bear is an arboreal herbivorous marsupial native to Australia.
- ❖ The koala is classified as 'vulnerable' by the International Union for Conservation of Nature due to habitat loss and widespread disease.







ENVIRONMENT

Recovery Programme for Critically Endangered Species

- ❖ The standing committee of National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) has recently added four species
 - o Northern River Terrapin species of riverine turtle found in rivers that flow in Eastern India.
 - Clouded Leopard found in Himalayan foothills The IUCN in its Red List assessment of 2016 has categorized Clouded Leopard as 'Vulnerable'
 - Arabian Sea Humpback Whale migrates from the Oman coast through the Arabian sea, along the Indian coasts till the Sri Lankan coast.
 - o Red Panda found Sikkim, West Bengal and Arunachal Pradesh The IUCN has categorized Red Panda as 'Endangered'.

into Centre's Recovery Programme for Critically Endangered Species.

- ❖ They were added on the recommendation by Wildlife Division of Ministry of Environment and Forests and Climate Change (MoEFCC).
- ❖ The programme is one of the three components of centrally funded scheme, Integrated Development of Wildlife Habitats (IDWH). It was started in 2008-09.
