





TNPSC BITS

- ❖ Tamil Nadu Chief Minister inaugurated the two-kilometre J. Anbazhagan Flyover in T. Nagar, the longest in Chennai.
- ❖ The third edition of the Unmesha International Literature Festival was held in Patna, Bihar.
- ❖ The Indian Navy conducted the joint exercise 'Jal Prahar 2025' with the Indian Army at Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh.
- ❖ The International Cricket Council (ICC) and UNICEF launched the "Promise to Children" campaign during the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2025.

Kanniyakumari Nannari



- * Kanniyakumari Nannari has been proposed for a Geographical Indication tag.
- * Kanniyakumari district is known for Nannari, a herb valued for its cooling properties and traditional use for treating mouth ulcers.
- ❖ The root of this Nannari is thicker, more aromatic, and deeper in colour than regular Nannari and is sun-dried, cleaned, and stored for medicinal and culinary use.





❖ The Kani tribe of the Southern Western Ghats has traditionally used Hemidesmus indicus in Siddha and Ayurvedic medicine as a blood purifier, body coolant, and digestive aid.

NATIONAL NEWS

Study in India (SII) portal

- ❖ The University Grants Commission (UGC) has made it mandatory for all foreign students studying in India to register on the Study in India (SII) portal from the academic year 2025–26.
- ❖ The Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) admitting foreign students must also register on the SII portal without exception.
- Study visas for foreign students will now be directly linked to the SII portal as per UGC instructions.
- Until now, there was no centralised tracking system for foreign students in India, causing issues in monitoring visa status and overstaying cases.



India-EFTA TEPA Agreement

❖ The India-European Free Trade Association (EFTA) Trade and Economic Partnership Agreement (TEPA) come into force on 01 October 2025.





- ❖ TEPA commits to USD 100 billion in foreign direct investment (FDI) and 1 million direct jobs in India over the next 15 years.
- ❖ EFTA will eliminate tariffs on 99.6% of India's exports, including 100% of non-agricultural products and key processed food items.
- ❖ India has opened 82.7% of its tariff lines covering 95.3% of EFTA exports, mainly gold, with no change in duty on gold.
- ❖ TEPA facilitates Mutual Recognition Agreements (MRAs) in professional services like nursing, accountancy, and architecture.



India's Dairy Sector status

- ❖ India remains the world's top milk producer, contributing about 25 per cent of the global milk supply.
- ❖ Milk output grew by 63.56 per cent in 10 years, from 146.3 to 239.3 million tonnes by 2023–24.
- ❖ Per capita milk availability rose by 48 per cent to 471 grams per day, above the global average.
- ❖ Dairy forms 5 per cent of India's GDP (gross domestic product), employing over 8 crore farmers.
- ❖ Shreeja Milk Producer Organisation won the Dairy Innovation Award in Chicago for women's empowerment.
- ❖ In 2024–25, 565.55 lakh artificial inseminations (AI) were carried out nationwide.
- ❖ India has 22 milk federations, 241 district unions, and 25 milk producer organisations.
- ❖ White Revolution 2.0 targets 75,000 new cooperatives and upgrading 46,422 existing ones by 2028–29.





INTERNATIONAL NEWS

FAO Conference 2025



❖ India participated in the 2nd Global Conference on Sustainable Livestock Transformation at the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) in Rome, Italy.





- ❖ India is the first vice chair of the FAO Sub-Committee on Livestock and maintains an 80-year partnership with the FAO.
- ❖ The livestock sector contributes 31% to agricultural Gross Value Added (GVA) and 5.5% to the national economy.
- ❖ India's livestock sector recorded a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 12.77% in recent years.
- ❖ The Bharat Pashudhan (National Digital Livestock Mission) has registered 353 million animals and 94 million livestock owners.
- Over 70% of the dairy workforce in India consists of women, enabled by cooperative models.

- ❖ Donald Trump released a 20-point proposal, calling for an immediate ceasefire and the return of all hostages within 72 hours.
- ❖ The plan includes Israeli withdrawal, amnesty for disarmed Hamas members, and transfer of Gaza governance to a technocratic committee.
- ❖ A transitional governance committee will manage Gaza, overseen by an international "Board of Peace" led by Trump.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY NEWS

Vaccine against IBR

❖ India's first indigenously developed glycoprotein E (gE) deleted DIVA marker vaccine against infectious bovine rhinotracheitis (IBR) was launched recently.





- ❖ The vaccine named Raksha-IBR will address infertility, abortions and reduced milk productivity linked to the disease.
- ❖ IBR is endemic in India and caused by Bovine Herpes Virus (BHV-1).
- ❖ The disease is transmitted through the aerosol route and affects the reproductive systems.
- ❖ It is also transmitted by semen from bulls to milch animals.
- ❖ Infertility, abortions and lower milk productivity are some of the major impacts of the disease.
- ❖ There is no vaccine available in India, and there is no specific treatment against this disease thus far.



First Radar Images of Earth




❖ NASA and ISRO's joint NISAR satellite was launched from Sriharikota, India.





- ❖ First radar images captured in August show Maine's Mount Desert Island and farmland in North Dakota.
- ❖ NASA's L-band radar detected forests, buildings, and crop fields; ISRO's S-band radar will observe vegetation.
- ❖ The satellite reached its 464-mile orbit in September and will begin full science operations in November 2025.

Drone-Mounted Radar Systems



- ❖ The Border Security Force (BSF) is developing radar-mounted drones in collaboration with ISRO for border surveillance.
- ❖ These drones will monitor India's western and eastern frontiers without crossing the international border.
- ❖ The BSF will manufacture these drones at its Tekanpur Academy located in Madhya Pradesh.
- * Radar-equipped drones will help detect movement of intruders, small vehicles, or smuggling attempts in real time.


Siphon Desalination

❖ The Scientists at the Indian Institute of Science (IISc) developed a siphon-based thermal desalination system using fabric wicks and metal surfaces.





- ❖ The system avoids salt buildup by flushing brine continuously, solving the main problem of traditional solar stills.
- ❖ The setup recycles heat across multiple stages, increasing water output using only solar or waste heat.
- ❖ Made from low-cost materials like aluminium and cloth, it works even with very salty water (up to 20% salt).



ENVIRONMENT NEWS

New coffee plant species



❖ A new coffee plant species was found in the Western Ghats.





- ❖ The species, Ophiorrhiza echinata, has not previously been reported in the Western Ghats.
- ❖ It was discovered in the biodiversity-rich shola forests at Devikulam in Idukki.
- ❖ It belongs to the family Rubiaceae and is closely related to the genus Ophiorrhiza mungos.
- ❖ There are over 100 coffee plant species, of which more than 10 species are found in the Western Ghats.

Red Sanders Conservation

THE COST AND THE CRIME

PRECIOUS COMMODITY

- Red Sanders Pterocarpus santalinus is a tree species native to Andhra Pradesh's Chittoor, Kadapa, Kurnool, Nellore & Prakasam districts
- The tree is on the endangered species list. Extraction of live trees is prohibited
- The brick red wood has immense value in countries like Japan, China and Myanmar where it is also used to make expensive furniture and musical instruments
- Smuggled wood in sent by land route through the Northeast states to Myanmar and by sea route to Singapore and Dubai
- In a recent auction, one tonne of

- A-grade logs were sold for ₹1.9 crore. Most of the wood is of B-and C-grades, valued at ₹55 lakh and ₹25 lakh, respectively
- In November 2014, AP earned ₹900 crore by auctioning 2,600 tonne of seized wood
- Bidders from China, Hong Kong, Singapore & Japan took part.
 Yoga guru Ramdev's Patanjali
 Yogpeeth also bought the wood, for 'medicinal purposes'
- Second batch auctioning of 3,500 tonne planned for June 17.

WELL-OILED NETWORK

- The smuggling racket operates from forest villages to international markets
- An order placed from abroad is


- communicated though middlemen to the local operator, who then calls the foreman who supplies the wood-cutters from TN
- Labourers are brought in trains or buses and, in the dark of the night, walk long distances to the heart of the forests where the trees are found
- Lower level forest officials guide them to the right patches
- The logs are chipped, cured and then loaded onto vehicles, concealed in rice husk, watermelons, oil tankers and even ambulances
- Red sanders smuggling involves various independent gangs. Often, it's the turf war that leads to a leak in information and the busting of a network.
- ❖ The National Biodiversity Authority (NBA) has sanctioned ₹82 lakh to the Andhra Pradesh Biodiversity Board for Red Sanders (Pterocarpus santalinus) conservation.
- ❖ The funds will be used to raise 1 lakh saplings of Red Sanders, which will be distributed to farmers under the Trees Outside Forests (ToF) programme.
- * Red Sanders is endemic to the Southern Eastern Ghats, especially in Anantapur, Chittoor, Kadapa, and Kurnool.
- ❖ It is listed under Appendix II under CITES and the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972.





REPORTS AND INDICES

Crimes against Children



- ❖ The National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) reported that 1,77,335 cases of crimes against children were registered in 2023.
- ❖ It was marking a 9.2% rise from 1,62,449 in 2022.
- ❖ The national crime rate against children increased to 39.9 per one lakh child population in 2023, up from 36.6 in 2022.
- ❖ Kidnapping and abduction made up 45% of the cases (79,884).
- ❖ Offences under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act accounted for 38.2% (67,694).
- ❖ Madhya Pradesh (22,393 cases), Maharashtra (22,390), and Uttar Pradesh (18,852) reported the highest case volumes.
- ❖ Assam had the highest rate at 84.2 per one lakh children.
- ❖ Delhi reported 7,769 cases with a high crime rate of 140.3, while the Andaman and Nicobar Islands had the highest rate at 143.4 per one lakh.
- ❖ The overall national charge-sheeting rate was 64.3%, with Tamil Nadu (93.7%) and Andhra Pradesh (91.3%) leading, and Delhi (31.7%) and Haryana (39.6%) on the lower end.


Prison Statistics India (PSI) 2023 Report

- ❖ The National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) released Prison Statistics India 2023.
- ❖ It was showing India's prison population dropped from 5,73,220 in 2022 to 5,30,333 in 2023.





- ❖ Despite the decline, the national average occupancy rate remained high at 120.8%.
- ❖ Delhi recorded the highest at 200% and Telangana recorded the lowest at 72.8%.
- ❖ India had 1,332 prisons housing 5.3 lakh inmates by December 2023, with undertrials making up 73.5% of all prisoners (3.84 lakh).
- ❖ Uttar Pradesh held the most undertrials (around 73,000).
- ❖ It is followed by Bihar (46,000+) and Maharashtra (32,000+); most were lodged in district and central jails.
- ❖ Delhi's 10,026-capacity jails held 20,077 inmates, while UP's jails housed 98,849 inmates against a capacity of 65,866.
- ❖ A total of 1,972 deaths were recorded in prisons—1,787 natural and 150 unnatural.
- Suicides accounted for 96 deaths, mainly through hanging.
- Punjab reported the highest number of unnatural deaths.
- ❖ Uttar Pradesh had the most inmates on death row, with 145 sentenced in 2023.



STATES' NEWS

Bathukamma Festival 2025

❖ Bathukamma, a floral festival celebrated mainly by women, has been declared the official State Festival of Telangana.





- ❖ It is observed for nine days during Durga Navratri, starting on Bhadrapada Amavasya (Mahalaya Amavasya) and ending on Saddula Bathukamma (Ashwayuja Ashtami), typically falling in September–October.
- The festival follows Boddemma (marking the end of monsoon) and signals the beginning of Sharad Ruthu (autumn), blending seasonal change with traditional rituals.



IMPORTANT DAYS

World Deaf Day 2025 - September 28



❖ World Deaf Day was first celebrated in 1958 by the World Federation of the Deaf to mark the achievements and rights of deaf people.





- ❖ It is observed on the last Sunday of September to coincide with the International Week of the Deaf.
- ❖ The 2025 theme is "Set the basis for the future: together we can innovate, inspire and impact!".
