TNPSC BITS

- ❖ The Fisher Friend Mobile Application, developed by M.S. Swaminathan Research Foundation (MSSRF), won the Tech4Nature Award at the IUCN World Conservation Congress in Abu Dhabi.
- ❖ The Siddi community in Junagadh district, Gujarat, a Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Group, achieved a literacy rate of over 72 %.
- ❖ India is hosting the United Nations Troop Contributing Countries' (UNTCC) Chiefs Conclave in New Delhi.
- ❖ Jasprit Bumrah becomes the first Indian fast bowler to play 50 Tests across all formats, achieving the milestone in the second Test against the West Indies.
- ❖ The Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) in Mumbai arrested 13 people, in a gold smuggling bust named Operation Golden Sweep.
- ❖ India and Australia are conducting the fourth edition of Exercise AUSTRAHIND 2025 in Perth, Australia.

TAMIL NADU NEWS

Cancelation of Class 11 Board Exams



- ❖ The Tamil Nadu government has cancelled the Class 11 public examination for the academic year 2025–2026.
- ❖ Government Order states that students will follow the pre-2017–2018 evaluation system.





❖ Class 11 board exams were originally introduced in 2017 to ensure uniform syllabus coverage.

Aran Illam

- Tamil Nadu Chief Minister launched 'Aran Illam' shelter homes for transgender persons.
- ❖ Two homes were opened in the first phase—one in Shenoy Nagar, Chennai, and the other in Anna Nagar, Madurai.
- ❖ Transgender individuals above 18 years with an ID from the State Transgender Welfare Board are eligible to stay.
- ❖ The shelter duration ranges from one month to three years based on individual needs.
- ❖ The homes provide counselling, education, free legal help, and support for family reintegration.


Sugamya Bharat App

- ❖ The government has launched a revamped version of the Sugamya Bharat App to enhance accessibility for Divyangian and elderly citizens.
- ❖ The New features include an AI-powered chatbot for real-time assistance and integration of government schemes for persons with disabilities.
- ❖ The app was originally launched by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment in 2021.
- ❖ It enables users to report accessibility issues in public infrastructure, transport, and ICT systems.





Pulses Mission 2025



The Prime Minister launched the Mission for Aatmanirbharta in Pulses (2025–26 to 2030–31) with a budget of ₹11,440 crore.





- ❖ The mission aims to increase domestic pulses production to 350 lakh tonnes and expand cultivation area to 310 lakh hectares by 2030–31.
- ❖ It guarantees 100 percent procurement of Tur (Arhar), Urad, and Masoor pulses at Minimum Support Price (MSP) for four years.
- ❖ The government plans to distribute 88 lakh free seed kits and 126 lakh quintals of certified seeds to farmers.

Special Purpose Fund - RDI Scheme

- ❖ The Executive Council of Anusandhan National Research Foundation (ANRF) approved guidelines and a Special Purpose Fund for the Research, Development, and Innovation (RDI) Scheme.
- ❖ The RDI Scheme includes a ₹1 Lakh crore fund approved by the Union Cabinet on July 1, 2025, under the Department of Science & Technology (DST).
- Funding is structured in two tiers:
 - o The Special Purpose Fund under ANRF, and
 - o Second-Level Fund Managers, such as Alternative Investment Funds, Development Finance Institutions, and focused research organizations.
- ❖ The scheme finances up to 50% of project costs for transformative research at Technology Readiness Levels 4 and above; grants and short-term loans are excluded.



INTERNATIONAL NEWS

Gaza Peace Summit 2025

❖ The Gaza Peace Summit was held in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt.





- ❖ It was co-hosted by U.S. President Donald Trump and Egyptian President Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi.
- ❖ The summit followed the release of all remaining hostages and a ceasefire deal between Israel and Hamas.
- ❖ The main aim was to strengthen efforts for regional peace and stability in the Middle East.



World's First Live Underwater Interview



❖ Palau, a Pacific island nation, has hosted the world's first-ever live underwater interview.






- ❖ Palau's President Surangel Whipps Jr interviewed with Estonian Olympic swimmer and activist Merle Liivand.
- ❖ The interview has used LiFi Talking Mask technology, which transmits sound underwater using light.
- ❖ Palau is an archipelago of about 340 islands located east of the Philippines.

ECONOMY NEWS

Unified Markets Interface



- ❖ The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) introduced the Unified Markets Interface (UMI) for tokenizing financial assets.
- ❖ The UMI uses wholesale Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC) and blockchain technology for asset tokenization.
- ❖ Tokenization allows fractional ownership and global trading of real-world assets through digital tokens.
- ❖ RBI also launched AI-based UPI HELP, IoT Payments with UPI, Banking Connect, and UPI Reserve Pay to improve digital payments.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY NEWS

Neutral-atom qubit array

❖ Caltech has developed the world's largest neutral-atom qubit array with 6,100 qubits, advancing towards error correction and large-scale quantum computing.





- ❖ A qubit is the fundamental unit of quantum information, acting as the quantum counterpart to a classical bit.
- ❖ The concept of the qubit was introduced by American theoretical physicist Benjamin Schumacher.
- Qubits are built using quantum particles like electrons, photons, trapped ions, atoms, and superconducting circuits.



Maitri II



❖ The Finance Ministry has approved the construction of Maitri II, India's fourth research station in Antarctica.





- ❖ Maitri II will be located in eastern Antarctica and is expected to be ready by January 2029.
- ❖ Maitri II will feature upgraded infrastructure, improved living conditions, and automated scientific instruments to relay data to India.
- Maitri, India's second Antarctic research station, was established in 1988.
- Dakshin Gangotri, an India's first Scientific Research Station, was operational till 1990.

ENVIRONMENT NEWS

Araneus nox Spider



- ❖ The spider species *Araneus nox* was spotted for the first time in India during a monsoon survey in Idukki Wildlife Sanctuary.
- ❖ The species was previously spotted only in Southeast Asia, including the Philippines, Malaysia, and Thailand.
- ❖ A total of 82 spider species from 20 families were spotted during the two-phase survey in August and September 2025.


Green Sea Turtle Population Status

- ❖ The IUCN has upgraded the green sea turtle (Chelonia mydas) status from Endangered to Least Concern after decades of global conservation efforts.
- ❖ The global green turtle population has increased by nearly 28% since the 1970s, despite ongoing threats to some subpopulations.





- Conservation successes include protecting nesting females and eggs, using Turtle Excluder Devices, and reducing unsustainable trade.
- ❖ Major recoveries were reported in Ascension Island, Brazil, Mexico, and Hawai'i, with some subpopulations nearing pre-commercial levels.
- ❖ The Southwest Pacific subpopulation, including Raine Island in Australia, shows declining hatchling production in recent years.



IUCN World Heritage Outlook 2025

- ❖ The 4th edition of the IUCN World Heritage Outlook was launched at the IUCN World Conservation Congress in Abu Dhabi.
- ❖ This report is a global assessment by the International Union for Conservation of Nature evaluating the conservation status of all natural and mixed UNESCO World Heritage Sites every 3 to 5 years.
- ❖ Over 80 % of natural heritage sites face direct climate risks such as coral bleaching, glacial melt, and wildfires.
- ❖ Approximately 10 % of global terrestrial carbon is stored in natural World Heritage Sites, supporting climate regulation.
- ❖ 15 sites were newly added to the "World Heritage in Danger" list, largely due to conflict, pollution, and ecosystem fragility.
- ❖ India has 7 natural and mixed World Heritage Sites, covering over 1.5 % of the global natural heritage area.





- ❖ The Sundarbans face mangrove decline due to rising salinity, cyclones, and sealevel rise, affecting biodiversity and protection services.
- ❖ The Western Ghats are under pressure from mining, construction, and land-use changes, threatening ecological balance.
- ❖ The Nanda Devi and the Great Himalayan National Park are experiencing glacial retreat and invasive species issues.



Armenia - Member of IUCN



❖ Armenia became the newest State Member of IUCN during the 2025 IUCN World Conservation Congress in Abu Dhabi.






- ❖ The country features diverse habitats, including alpine meadows, mountain forests, semi-deserts, and freshwater ecosystems.
- * Rare species in Armenia include the Critically Endangered Caucasian leopard, the endemic Bezoar goat, and the Sevan trout found only in Lake Sevan.
- ❖ Armenia aims to restore forests across 12.9% of its territory by 2030 and integrate Nature-based Solutions into national policies.

REPORTS AND INDICES

IUCN report 2025

- ❖ The Global Land Outlook Thematic Report on Ecological Connectivity and Land Restoration report was launched at the IUCN World Conservation Congress in Abu Dhabi.
- ❖ It was prepared by the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) and the Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals (CMS).
- ❖ The report urges countries to include ecological connectivity in land, water, and infrastructure planning.
- ❖ Ecological connectivity means the unimpeded movement of species, the connection of habitats, and the flow of natural processes sustaining life on Earth.



PERSONALITIES, AWARDS, AND EVENTS

International Ranger Awards 2025

- ❖ 13 rangers and ranger teams received the 2025 International Ranger Awards for their service in wildlife and forest protection.
- ❖ The awards were presented by the IUCN World Commission on Protected Areas.





- ❖ Winners from 13 countries, including Ukraine and Burkina Faso, received grants between USD 5,000 and 25,000.
- ❖ The awards aim to raise awareness of rangers' crucial role in global biodiversity and ecosystem protection.



IUCN Kenton Miller Award 2025



❖ Sonali Ghosh, Director of Kaziranga National Park and Tiger Reserve, received the Kenton R. Miller Award.





- ❖ She is the first Indian to win this international award for innovation in national parks and protected area sustainability.
- ❖ The award was presented by the World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA), part of IUCN.
- ❖ The Kenton R. Miller Award recognises innovations in planning, management, governance, and community engagement in protected areas.

MISCELLANEOUS NEWS

Durand Line Clash 2025

- ❖ Fierce clashes occurred along the Durand Line, the Afghanistan-Pakistan border.
- ❖ The Afghan forces captured multiple Pakistani military outposts in Kunar and Helmand provinces.
- ❖ Pakistan closed key border crossings, including Torkham and Chaman, stopping trade between the countries.
- ❖ It was established in 1893 as the international border between the Emirate of Afghanistan and the British Indian Empire.



World's First Virtual Museum

- ❖ The UNESCO has launched the world's first Virtual Museum of Stolen Cultural Objects.
- ❖ It showcases nearly 240 missing artifacts from 46 countries.





- ❖ The platform was unveiled at the World Conference on Cultural Policies and Sustainable Development, known as MONDIACULT.
- ❖ The virtual museum is designed to empty itself as items are physically recovered and repatriated.
