



TAMIL NADU NEWS

Tamil Nadu Cotton Farmers on MSP

- ❖ Cotton farmers in Tamil Nadu are not benefiting from Minimum Support Price (MSP) operations by the Cotton Corporation of India (CCI).
- ❖ Since 2021, CCI has not procured any cotton from Tamil Nadu farmers despite its mandate to do so when prices fall below MSP.
- ❖ Cotton cultivation in Tamil Nadu is spread across 19 districts covering nearly 70,000 hectares, but ginning factories are located 100 to 200 km away.
- ❖ CCI procurement rules require a minimum of 3,000 hectares of cotton cultivation in a taluk and a ginning factory within 20 km to set up a procurement centre.
- ❖ Transport costs to ginning factories in Tamil Nadu are about ₹500 per quintal, but MSP operations do not cover transportation expenses.
- ❖ Andhra Pradesh supports farmers by covering transportation costs, and similar support is recommended for Tamil Nadu to aid cotton growers.




Underwater Archaeological Survey

- ❖ The Tamil Nadu State Department of Archaeology will start an underwater survey off the Poompuhar-Nagapattinam coast in mid-September 2025.
- ❖ The survey aims to investigate submerged remains and uncover Tamil Nadu's maritime history.
- ❖ The Experts from the Indian Maritime University, National Institute of Ocean Technology, and National Institute of Oceanography will assist in the study.





❖ Previous surveys in the 1980s and early 2000s revealed underwater structures and shipwrecks in the region.



The Tamil Nadu State Department of Archaeology (TNSDA) has launched a significant initiative to explore the submerged historical treasures of Poompuhar, or Kaveripoompattinam, the ancient port city and early capital of the Cholas. This effort, announced in the 2025–26 Budget by Finance Minister Thangam Thennarasu, focuses on deep-sea excavations between Poompuhar and Nagapattinam, a 50-kilometer stretch along the Tamil Nadu coast.

DGP Appointment in Tamil Nadu



- ❖ Senior Indian Police Service Officer G. Venkatraman has been appointed as the Director-General of Police in charge of Tamil Nadu.
- ❖ He assumed office on August 31, 2025, succeeding Shankar Jiwal.
- ❖ He will hold office until a regular Director-General of Police is appointed.
- ❖ The appointment of a regular Director-General of Police will follow Supreme Court guidelines from the Prakash Singh case of 2018.





- ❖ The Tamil Nadu government has sent a list of eight Director-General of Police rank officers to the Union Public Service Commission for empanelment.
- ❖ The top three names will be shortlisted by the Union Public Service Commission and sent back to the state for final appointment.
- ❖ This is the first time in recent years that Tamil Nadu has not immediately followed the Supreme Court ruling on appointing the Director-General of Police.
- ❖ In 2018, K. Ramanujam was appointed with a fixed two-year tenure following the Prakash Singh case.
- ❖ The delay in sending the proposal for the new Director-General of Police to the UPSC caused the current temporary appointment.


Indian Rosewood Trees

- ❖ The Tamil Nadu government did not renew the Tamil Nadu Rosewood (Conservation) Act, 1995, beyond February 2025.
- ❖ Indian rosewood (Dalbergia latifolia) is native to Tamil Nadu's Nilgiris, Anamalai, and Parambikulam ranges.
- ❖ Only 17.2% of India's suitable habitat for Indian rosewood lies within protected areas.
- * Rosewood trees improve soil fertility through nitrogen fixation.
- * They support bird and insect diversity and act as long-term carbon sinks.
- ❖ Recent field studies from 2019 to 2025 show Tamil Nadu has 2.85 rosewood trees per 0.1 hectare.
- ❖ Karnataka and Kerala recorded higher densities with 6.19 and 5.38 trees per 0.1 hectare, respectively.
- ❖ Populations in Tamil Nadu are dominated by mature, ageing trees with almost no natural regeneration.
- Seedlings of rosewood are rare or absent in many areas of Tamil Nadu.
- ❖ The Conservation Act prohibited cutting rosewood without government permission until it lapsed in 2025.
- ❖ Private rosewood trees, especially in Nilgiris tea plantations, are at risk without legal protection.
- ❖ Habitat modelling identified Nilgiris, Coimbatore, Erode, Tiruppur, Dindigul, and Theni as core districts for rosewood.
- ❖ Indian rosewood is listed under Appendix II of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES).





- ❖ The species has been classified as Vulnerable by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) since 2018.
- ❖ India's last national assessment in 2011-12 listed Indian rosewood as Near Threatened.



Tharangambadi Danish Fort



- ❖ The Danish Fort at Tharangambadi was built in 1620 by Danish nobleman Ove Gjedde.
- ❖ The fort spans 36,410 square feet and is over 400 years old.
- ❖ The fort was used as a base for Danish settlers and is a symbol of Denmark's colonial presence in India.
- **❖** The Tamil Nadu State Department of Archaeology sanctioned ₹3.63 crore for the fort's restoration.





- * Restoration work on the fort began on June 1, 2023.
- ❖ The Governor's Bungalow at Tharangambadi was built in 1793.
- ❖ It was used by Danish governors and later taken over by the British in 1845.
- ❖ The two-storey bungalow covers 10,220 square feet.
- ❖ The bungalow is known for its tall pillars, central courtyard, and grand halls.
- ❖ A total of ₹4.33 crore was sanctioned for restoring the Governor's Bungalow.
- ❖ The restoration work is expected to be completed by November 2025.

Blue Flag Expansion in Tamil Nadu



- ❖ The Environment, Climate Change, and Forest Department of Tamil Nadu has selected six beaches for Blue Flag certification.
- ❖ The selected beaches include Tiruvanmiyur, Palavakkam, and Uthandi in the Chennai Metropolitan Area.
- ❖ Kulasekarapattinam beach in Thoothukudi, Keezhputhupattu beach in Villupuram, and Samiyarpettai beach in Cuddalore are also included.
- ❖ Each beach will receive ₹4 crore for upgradation, totalling ₹24 crore.
- ❖ Funds are allocated under the Tamil Nadu Sustainable Harnessing Ocean Resources and Blue Economy (TN-SHORE) scheme.
- ❖ The Blue Flag certification requires compliance with 33 international criteria.
- ❖ These criteria cover marine water quality, environmental education, safety, tourist facilities, and environmental management.





- Marina Beach, Silver Beach, Kameshwaram Beach, and Ariyamaan Beach were previously approved by the Tamil Nadu State Coastal Zone Management Authority.
- ❖ Kovalam Beach in Chengalpattu was Tamil Nadu's first Blue Flag-certified beach in September 2021.

NATIONAL NEWS

Nomination of members to NDMA



- ❖ The Prime Minister nominated two new members and renominated three existing members to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA).
- ❖ Scientist Dinesh Kumar Aswal and disaster recovery specialist Rita Missal were nominated as new members of the NDMA.
- * Rajendra Singh, Krishna Swaroop Vatsa, and Lieutenant General Syed Ata Hasnain (Retired) were renominated for another three-year term.
- ❖ The appointments are made under Section 3(2)(b) of the Disaster Management Act, 2005, for a term of three years or until further orders.
- ❖ The Prime Minister serves as the Chairperson of the NDMA, which is the apex body for disaster management in India.
- ❖ The NDMA is responsible for formulating policies, plans, and guidelines for disaster prevention, mitigation, preparedness, and response.

Digital Connectivity Rating Agencies

❖ The Telecom Regulatory Authority of India (TRAI) has registered eight agencies as Digital Connectivity Rating Agencies (DCRAs).





- ❖ This was made under the Rating of Properties for Digital Connectivity Regulations, 2024.
- ❖ The registrations were granted on August 27, 2025, and are valid for five years, subject to compliance with regulations.
- ❖ The eight registered DCRAs include Ardom Towergen, Crest Digitel, CTL Infocom, ESTEX Telecom, Frog Cellsat, Phistream Consulting, Shaurrya Teleservices, and TUV SUD South Asia.
- ❖ These agencies will assess digital infrastructure in buildings and assign star ratings based on a standardised methodology released by TRAI.
- * Ratings will be based on criteria such as fibre readiness, mobile and Wi-Fi coverage, broadband speeds, and overall digital user experience.



INTERNATIONAL NEWS

1st Purple Notice of Interpol








- ❖ The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has secured its first Purple Notice from the International Criminal Police Organisation (Interpol).
- ❖ The Purple Notice alerts 196 member countries about a newly identified tradebased money laundering (TBML) network operating across borders.
- ❖ The notice details how shell companies used forged trade documents, underinvoiced imports, and circular re-exports to move illicit funds.
- ❖ The Purple Notice helps global agencies share intelligence on concealment methods and strengthens cooperation through networks like ARIN-AP and the Globe Network.

ENVIRONMENT NEWS

Forest Rights in India



- ❖ This 2025 report titled Securing Rights, Enabling Futures: Policy Lessons from Forest Rights Act and Future Pathways was released by UNDP India in partnership with the Foundation for Ecological Security.
- ❖ The Forest Rights Act (FRA), enacted in 2006, aims to recognise the rights of forest-dwelling tribal communities in India.
- ❖ The study focuses on three Indian states with significant tribal populations: Odisha, Chhattisgarh, and Maharashtra.
- ❖ Globally, community land rights are linked to improved forest governance, climate resilience, and carbon mitigation, as noted by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) in 2019.
- ❖ By 31 May 2025, 25,11,375 titles have been distributed under FRA, covering 23.2 million acres of forest land.





- ❖ It included 5.07 million acres under individual and 18.19 million acres under community rights.
- ❖ The Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA) supports FRA implementation through training, monitoring, and budget allocations under the Dharti Aaba Janjatiya Gram Utkarsh Abhiyan (DA-JGUA).
- ❖ The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) has partnered with MoTA and six state governments to support FRA implementation and convergence with development programmes.

Vaquitas Extinction



- ❖ Mexico's poor enforcement of the law led to the impending extinction of the vaquita porpoise, with just 10 remaining worldwide.
- ❖ Illegal gillnet fishing targeting totoaba fish in the Gulf of California is the main threat, as vaquitas get caught unintentionally in these nets.
- ❖ Despite a fishing gear ban since 2020, enforcement in Mexico remains weak, with fishing activities continuing at previous levels.
- ❖ The vaquita porpoise (little cow in Spanish) is the world's most endangered marine mammal, discovered in 1958.
- ❖ It is listed as Critically Endangered in the IUCN Red List.

REPORTS AND INDICES

State Energy Efficiency Index 2024

❖ The Bureau of Energy Efficiency (BEE) released the State Energy Efficiency Index (SEEI) 2024, in collaboration with the Alliance for an Energy Efficient Economy (AEEE).





- ❖ The index assesses the energy efficiency performance of 36 States and Union Territories for the financial year 2023–24.
- ❖ States are grouped by total energy consumption (MToE) and ranked under four categories: Front Runners, Achievers, Contenders, and Aspirants.
- ❖ Top performers in their respective groups are Maharashtra (>15 MToE), Andhra Pradesh (5–15 MToE), Assam (1–5 MToE), and Tripura (<1 MToE).
- ❖ The SEEI 2024 supports data-driven policy, interstate learning, and India's netzero goal by 2070.
